The Regular Meeting of the Township Committee of the Township of Washington was called to order by Mayor Roehrich at 7:33 PM.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Comm. Babb, LiaBraaten, Murello, Vice Mayor Short, Mayor Roehrich

OTHERS PRESENT: Administrator Coppola, Attorney Jansen, Municipal Clerk DiGregorio, Office Manager Lyons

Adequate notice of this meeting was sent to the Daily Record and the Observer Tribune on January 7, 2016 and was posted on the bulletin board in the Municipal Building on the same date. This meeting is being held at the Washington Township Municipal Building, 43 Schooley's Mountain Road, Long Valley, New Jersey. Notices of this meeting were sent, as there were requests.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

<u>MAYOR'S UPDATE. Mayor Roehrich</u> informed the Committee that he attended the St. Patrick's Day Luncheon last week, where 50 Senior Citizens enjoyed Irish food and music. He thanked the employees and volunteers who made the event possible.

The 2016 Municipal Budget will be introduced tonight. A public hearing on the budget will be held on April 18 after which it can be adopted. The budget increase is 1.66% and the tax rate increase is 1.64% due to an increase in added assessments and a decrease in tax appeals. The average township home will see a \$30 increase. For the third year in a row Washington Township has the lowest taxes in Morris County.

<u>Mayor Roehrich</u> made a statement regarding the proposed police pistol range. Tonight's agenda includes a discussion proposing the formation of an Ad Hoc Police Range Committee.

PRESENTATION – WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP HISTORICAL SOCIETY GRANT APPLICATION

Historical Committee Members <u>Eileen Stokes</u> and <u>Mary Ann Kordys</u> requested that the Committee endorse a grant application to the Morris County Historic Preservation Trust for new windows. A municipal endorsement is needed at this time and no out of pocket funds are anticipated for 2016.

Motion was made by <u>Vice Mayor Short</u>, seconded by <u>Comm. Murello</u> to endorse the Historical Society's grant application. Motion was carried by the following roll call vote:

PUBLIC PORTION. Mayor Roehrich opened the meeting to the public.

<u>William Leavens</u>, 359 W. Mill Rd, expressed public safety concerns regarding W. Mill Rd. He presented a letter signed by 40 residents requesting a lower speed limit. <u>Mayor Roehrich</u> stated that this has been addressed with the County in the past and he will take it up with the County again.

Dr Daphnie Soares, 380 West Mill Rd., also expressed concerns with speeding and recent accidents on W. Mill Rd.

<u>Angel Garcia</u>, 7 Markham Drive, questioned the criteria for the assessment of the need for road improvements. He would like the Township to look at West Springtown Road. The mayor advised that <u>DPW Superintendent Scott Frech</u> would follow up with <u>Mr. Garcia</u>.

<u>Mike Mixon</u>, 5 Stone Hill Court, asked for clarification on the proposed County Open Space meeting. <u>Mayor Roehrich</u> said there will be further discussion about the police range later this evening, but the meeting is tentatively scheduled for April 26^{th} . This may change if an Ad Hoc Committee is created.

Michael Marino, 24 Setting Sun Drive, stated that communication has been lacking regarding the proposed police range.

<u>Michael Flammer</u>, 9 Shadow Hill Way, stated that other large municipalities do not have their own police ranges, and he does not believe it is necessary in Washington Township. He expressed his concerns regarding environmental impacts and the noise that would impact special needs children and pets.

<u>Radhika Kommineni</u>, 2 Stone Hill Ct., does not support the police range. She urged the Township Committee to consider pets and children in making their decision.

<u>Kris Tornabene</u>, 6 Setting Sun Drive, has been a school psychologist for 24 years. The range and its proximity to homes and the school will have a negative impact on special needs children and senior citizens.

<u>Steve Maciejewski</u>, 10 Shadow Hill Way, expressed disappointment in the way information has been distributed and asked what criteria the police used. <u>Mayor Roehrich</u> stated that there will be improved communication and suggested that <u>Mr.</u> <u>Maciejewski</u> contact <u>Chief Almer</u> to discuss the location selection criteria.

Jospeh Palermo, 17 Setting Sun Drive, opposes the police range and would like to know the specific reason for the range. Is it cost, scheduling, or some other factor?

<u>Chief Almer</u> provided a brief overview of the proposed range and location selection. <u>Chief Almer</u> stated that the proposed police range would be used exclusively by the Washington Township Police Department. The proposed range will increase the quality and efficiency of the training that the officers receive.

Julia Murray, 7 Reservoir Rd., noted that residents are stake holders in his matter and everyone needs to work together.

Joe Kaplan, 52 Reservoir Rd., is concerned about the proposed police range, and would like to find a way to have a well-trained police force without a police range in our town.

Unidentified residents began loudly voicing their opposition from the audience.

<u>Ashish Parikh</u>, 19 North Ridge Ct., asked for details on what is required for officers to 'qualify' and how many days would be involved. <u>Chief Almer</u> provided an overview of the police officer qualification process. <u>Chief Almer</u> stated that he proposed that the range be used 6-8 days each year.

<u>Rich Read</u>, 23 Shadow Hill Way, believes the proposed range is a mistake and is concerned about the possibility of ricochets and proximity to Route 46.

Chris Laucella, 15 Setting Sun Dr., believes that specialty training will be costly.

Sue Caracciolo, 25 Setting Sun Dr., does not support the proposed police range.

<u>Steve Macrejewski</u>, 10 Shadow Hill Way, suggested active shooter training in schools without live ammunition. <u>Chief</u> <u>Almer</u> stated that such raining has been and will continue to be provided.

PUBLIC PORTION. There being no further questions or comments, Mayor Roehrich closed the meeting to the public.

DISCUSSION - Creation of an Ad Hoc Police Range Advisory Committee

<u>Mayor Roehrich</u> suggested that an Ad Hoc Committee, advisory in nature be formed consisting of 5-7 residents from various sections of the Township. <u>Attorney Jansen</u> suggested that Police, the Township Planner, the Township Engineer, and a representative from the Township Committee be included on the committee as advisory members, not voting members. It was agreed to send a letter to the County to withdraw the diversion request at this time.

PUBLIC PORTION. Mayor Roehrich reopened the meeting to the public.

<u>Michael Mixon</u>, 5 Stone Hill Court, thanked the Committee for proposing the Ad Hoc Committee. <u>Mr. Mixon</u> wanted to confirm the Ad Hoc Committee meetings will be public and advisory only. <u>Mayor Roehrich</u> confirmed his understanding.

Geoff Cook, 25 North Ridge Court, suggested that the words 'gun range' not be in the title of the Ad Hoc Committee.

Renato, Derech, 16 Shadow Hill Way, questioned how to be considered for membership on the Ad Hoc Committee

In was agreed that Citizen Volunteer Applications will be received until April 20. These forms are available on the Municipal Web Site. After April 20, interviews will be scheduled and appointments will be made at the May meeting.

Resident at 7 Shadow Hill Way (name was not recorded) asked that Ad Hoc Committee have access to professionals who can help guide the evaluation, and indicated that the residents may even be willing to pay for professionals.

<u>Susan Caracciolo</u>, 25 Setting Sun Drive, requested a copy of the letter to the County Open Space Committee withdrawing the diversion request.

<u>Michael Mixon</u>, 5 Stone Hill Court, asked for confirmation that the Ad Hoc Committee meetings will be open to the public. Mayor Roehrich stated that they will be open to the public.
