

What is OEM?

The Office of Emergency Management (OEM) is a local government department that provides for the health, safety and welfare of residents during times of emergency and disaster. Emergency Management has an active role in towns and cities nationwide, and focuses on municipal preparedness, response and recovery from all types of natural and man-made disasters. OEM managers work closely with local Fire Companies, First Aid Squads, Departments of Public Works, and Health Departments to coordinate activities and resources for maximum effectiveness.

There are several things you can do to be better prepared for an emergency. The Washington Township OEM encourages all residents to:

Plan Ahead

Create a family emergency plan based on what you've learned from previous events. Identify your needs and plan for them. Consider family members, pets, and the elderly in your plans. Consider combining resources with neighbors.

Stay Informed

Know how and where to get information. Familiarize yourself with available resources, explore helpful websites, and sign up for emergency alerts and notifications BEFORE you need them.

Be Prepared

Have nonperishable food, water, batteries, medicines, fuel, cash and a portable radio on hand. Have your utility service provider and insurance company contact information on hand. Keep vehicles fueled and serviced. If you have a generator, know how to use it safely. If you rely on well water, have a backup plan if it stops working.



Get Involved

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program helps train residents to be better prepared to respond to emergency situations in their communities. To volunteer as a local CERT member, you must complete an application and pass a background check.

Reverse 911 alerts

When critical emergency information need to be shared, Washington Township will utilize the RAVE System to issue alerts and notifications by phone to all residential and business with land line telephones. Landline numbers are added automatically. If you would like another number added (cell phone, work number, alternate contact) you may add that number at www.Smart911.com. Numbers associated with a VOIP service may not be automatically added, and should be added by residents.

Receive Nixle alerts on your mobile phone

Washington Township also sends alerts by text message to mobile devices capable of receiving standard Short Message Service (SMS) text messaging. To sign up, send a text message containing the Washington Township zip code – **07853** – to address **888777**.
